- 7 In what ways can we view the experience of Essex people in the light of the concept of total war?

- 8 How did people react to the fact that Essex was a front-line county in this new type of warfare?
- 9 How did people interpret the war at the beginning, during the conflict, and at its conclusion?
- 10 How did this contemporary interpretation match the views that have developed about the war in the later 20th century?
- 11 What was the long-term impact of the war?
- 12 How did those who lived through the war commemorate their victory and the sacrifice of so many?
- 13 Why has the war been commemorated for a whole century?
